ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT









Help us follow the trajectory of your career.

After graduating from TBS in 2006, I studied pharmacy in Delhi, where I became fascinated by how science could directly shape patient care. That interest took me to London for an MSc and PhD at University College London (UCL), focusing on drug delivery and biomaterials in eye health. During and after my PhD, I co-founded a biotech company based on my research while also working as a Research Fellow at UCL, where I led innovation projects across academia, industry and clinical settings. Balancing both roles taught me how to move between scientific depth and strategic decisionmaking. Today, I work as a Senior Consultant at IQVIA, designing real-world evidence studies that help pharmaceutical, biotech and MedTech clients understand how treatments work in practice. Across every role, my goal has been the same: to translate science into meaningful outcomes.

How did TBS help you in your journey?

TBS gave me more than just a strong academic foundation: it shaped how I think, communicate and lead. The environment encouraged asking questions, not just memorising answers, which built a mindset I carried through research, entrepreneurship and Being surrounded by a diverse, consulting. international community taught me how to collaborate across cultures and disciplines, a skill that's proven invaluable in my career. I also had the freedom to explore different interests, from science and writing to volunteering, without being boxed in too early. That flexibility helped me build a career that spans multiple sectors without ever feeling like I had to compromise one passion for another. Even as a student, I appreciated what a rare and empowering space TBS was-it gave me the confidence to take risks, stay curious and trust my own direction.

During your PhD at UCL, you worked on drug delivery and biomaterials. What drew you to this area of research?

I was drawn to drug delivery because it offered a way to tackle real, unresolved challenges in medicine, particularly in improving how therapies reach the right part of the body in the right way. The eye stood out as an especially difficult target: it's highly protected, and delivering drugs effectively to the back of the eye remains a major clinical hurdle. I was interested in the idea that biomaterials could be designed to overcome some of those barriers: by controlling how drugs are

released, where they go, and how long they last. My research focused on developing injectable systems for sustained delivery, which involved everything from formulation and material characterisation to in vitro and preclinical evaluation. It was hands-on, technically challenging work, but it also had clear potential to improve patient care. That combination—science with a defined purpose—is what kept me motivated, and it shaped how I've approached every role since.

Looking back on your journey so far, what's something you're especially proud of?

I'm proud of how I've learned to stay steady in uncertain moments. My path hasn't followed a traditional route, and there have been points where the direction ahead wasn't obvious, i.e. transitions, pivots or ideas that didn't land the way I hoped. But I've come to see those moments as just as important as the milestones. They've taught me how to listen more carefully, think more clearly and make decisions without needing every answer upfront. I'm also proud that I've stayed curious throughout, even when things were difficult or uncertain, I never lost interest in the work or in learning something new.



It's easy to move quickly from one role or achievement to the next, but I think what matters most is how you grow between them. For me, that growth and the mindset behind it have been the most rewarding part so far.

What were some of the most exciting, and challenging, aspects of running a start-up while leading scientific innovation?

Building a start-up from my PhD research was one of the most intense and rewarding learning experiences of my career. It was exciting to translate academic science into something with real-world potential, shaping not just the research, but the strategy, partnerships, and vision behind it. At the same time, navigating the complexities of early-stage growth brought challenges, particularly around sustainability and alignment as the company evolved. The experience taught me a great deal about resilience, decision-making, and how to move forward even when outcomes are uncertain. It reminded me that innovation is rarely linear, and that some of the most meaningful progress comes from the willingness to try, reflect, and adapt.

Do you have a favourite memory from your time at TBS?

Some of my best memories aren't tied to one moment, but to the energy and community that defined life at TBS. I still remember the excitement of Sports Day, proudly representing Green House and competing against the other teams, each event bringing out a mix of determination and school spirit.



Whether we were planning house event or showing up in full force to support each other, there was always a shared pride in being part of something bigger than yourself. Beyond the events, it was the everyday places that made it special. The basketball courts or the auditorium were our social hubs, and the old X rooms (now long gone) were where friendships deepened over life updates, last-minute revision and plenty of laughter. TBS created a space where competition and connection went hand in hand, and where a sense of belonging was simply part of the everyday.
















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
